Cybercrimes Hit Hard during This Time of the Year

Safeguards Can Protect You and Your Family Year Round from Internet Fraud

The Holiday Season is here. It's the time that many of us look forward to – families spending time together, various faith-based communities celebrate and retailers make 20 to 40 percent of their annual sales over a six-week period. It's a time of year that many criminals look forward to as well. They're always ready to take advantage of every vulnerable situation they can find.

According to FBI statistics, just about every area of crime is up during this time of the year, including murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and stolen motor vehicles. Cybercrimes also increase during the holiday season.

In general, e-commerce provides us with many opportunities and conveniences, enabling us to conduct business and do much of our shopping over the internet without leaving our homes.

Hi-tech criminals are always ready to seize an opportunity to steal your money and personal information.



These cybercriminals have devised many creative ways to remotely rob their victims. According to the FBI, scammers use many techniques to fool potential victims, including fraudulent auction sales, reshipping merchandise purchased with a stolen credit card, sale of fraudulent or stolen gift cards through auction sites at discounted prices, and phishing e-mails advertising brand name merchandise for bargain prices or e-mails promoting the sale of brand name merchandise that is actually a counterfeit product.

There is a saying regarding specious deals that has probably been around for centuries – "if a deal seems too good to be true, it probably is." This information about cybercrime isn't meant to frighten you, but to merely remind you to be careful.

Here are some tips provided by the FBI to help you avoid becoming a victim of cybercrime:

- Do not respond to unsolicited (spam) e-mails.
- Do not click on links contained within an unsolicited e-mails.
- Be cautious of any e-mail claiming to contain pictures in attached files, as the files may contain viruses.
 Only open attachments from known senders. Always run a virus scan on an attachments before opening.
- Avoid filling out forms contained in e-mail messages that ask for personal information.

- Always compare the link in the e-mail to the web address link you are directed to and determine if they match.
- Log on directly to the official Web site for the business identified in the e-mail instead of "linking" to it from an unsolicited e-mail. If the e-mail appears to be from your bank, credit card issuer, or other company you deal with frequently, your statements
- or official correspondence from the business will provide the proper contact information.
- Contact the actual business that supposedly sent the e-mail to verify that the e-mail is genuine.
- If you are requested to act quickly or there is an emergency, it may be a scam. Fraudsters create a sense of urgency to get you to act impulsively

RBPD Support Staff, Behind the Scenes But on Top of the Issues

The Riviera Beach Police Department's Support Staff is usually out of sight of the public, but now we're going to shine the spotlight on them. This group is an integral part of the RBPD Team. These are the women who provide vital functions to ensure Police services operate efficiently and effectively. A summary of their duties includes: providing administrative assistance to RBPD's executive staff (Chief, Assistant Chiefs and Majors), taking care of payroll, managing Departmental finances / budgets / grants, ensuring police personnel have needed uniforms and equipment, coordinating special events, and keeping Police personnel files up-to-date.

Members of the Support Staff stay behind the scenes, doing their jobs, enabling Sworn Law Enforcement Officers on the frontlines to focus on the more pressing issues. Often, Support Staff personnel find themselves serving as Customer Service Representatives – receiving calls and resolving matters on their own, saving customers' time by avoiding the involvement of upper management.

"Though they might be asking for the Chief or one of the Assistant Chiefs, a lot of the times a caller just wants someone to listen to them," said Ms. Tanya Franklin, Office Assistant, Senior to Robert Coppin, Assistant Chief of Police. "I empathize with them and if I don't

have the answer to their concerns off the top of my head, I will get it for them. With that, the caller is usually calm, and I get a thank you."

Ms. Susan Rosen, Senior Staff Assistant to Michael Madden, Assistant Chief of Police, recalls similar experiences. Susan said, "I enjoy being able to take the pressure off of the executives whenever I can so they can concentrate on their higher priorities."

Working directly with Chief Williams as his Administrative Assistant, is Ms. Tawanna Smith. Among her duties, she likes the special assignments, which, in most instances, have her working with the community – often kids. "I love seeing the Department and the City making strides. After all, I was born and raised here."

Payroll is always an attention getter. Ms. Monica Daniels, Senior Staff Assistant, is RBPD's person responsible for processing payroll. "One of the most important aspects of my job is making sure when processing payroll that employees are in compliance with Contract Language/Policies whenever applicable," said Ms. Daniels.

Keeping the Majors (five in total) on their toes is their Administrative Assistant, Ms. April Baker, Senior Staff Assistant. "Making sure that officers get

their job evaluations done in a timely manner is one of my key responsibilities," said Ms. Baker. "I also make officers aware of training opportunities, and seeing them excel makes my day."

Ms. LaVatryce Griffin, Senior Staff Assistant under Assistant Chief Michael Madden, is responsible for the Department's finances / budgets / grants. She is also responsible for seeing that officers get the uniforms, equipment, and supplies they need. "Satisfaction to me is simply, getting things done," said Ms. Griffin.

The newest member of the group, onboard for about three months, is Eugenia Francis-Cowart, Office Assistant, Senior. She assists with payroll, and has quickly become a valued member of the Support Team.

Commission On Social Justice Youth City Government in Place

We are very pleased to announce the establishment of the Riviera Beach Youth City Government. At this point, 20 Riviera Beach Youth Government positions have been filled. The young adults filling these positions are students at Inlet Grove Community High School and the Riviera Beach Maritime Academy. The students voluntarily responded to COSJ requests for student participation in the new program.

Each position was filled through the process of a show of hands of those interested in the position. In cases where there were more than one person interested in a specific position, each person was required to explain why they wanted the position. The students then voted for the person they wanted.

"Thanks to the huge response from so many city departments to participate in the program, we will have enough

positions for an, almost, unlimited number of students," said Mr. Sloser. "Dr. Drayton had a flyer developed that will be circulated around the City to recruit more students. Also, public service announcements to encourage more students to join will be aired on RBTV Channel 18."

The Youth City Council meetings will be held monthly from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. in Riviera Beach City Council Chambers and aired on Channel 18. The public is encouraged to attend in support of the students. The first Youth City Council meeting is set for Thursday, December 11th.

Riviera Beach City Council members will provide their youth counterpart council with one agenda item. The

students will be responsible for developing the balance of their agenda to talk about the things they most care about. The City Clerk's Office will help them with formatting. The students will be required to follow a strict dress code young men must wear a jacket and tie.

After the students have had a couple months of experience, the Youth City Council will

be on City Council's agenda, at its regular council session, to report on the results of their council meeting.
